Message from our Minister

Joy Harjo

I remember myself in the middle of a grassy field. I was reminded by the dragon fly hovering nearby. I took a breath and remembered, remembered how grateful I am for my eyes and sight - for being able to see and absorb colors. Aah, the colors. Green is the color I associate with summertime. And seeing a green mountain, like a rolling sea of green, I'm encouraged to look deeper, to begin to see the many shades of green, the variations. Summer offers the most brilliant blue of skies, the deep green of hills and grasses; the heat of the days, the cool quiet at night. "Remember the dance language is, that life is. Remember." Poet and writer, Joy Harjo was chosen to be the poet laureate, the first Native American to ever hold the title. She shares that "it's such an honoring for Native people in this country, when we've been so disappeared and disregarded," Harjo says. "And yet we're the root cultures, over 500-something tribes and I don't know how many at first contact. But it's quite an honor ... I bear that honor on behalf of the people and my ancestors. So that's really exciting for me."

I have read and shared Joy Harjo's poetry for many years. Her descriptions of people, the earth and her culture are intense and real, beautiful and haunting in their stark reality. She is deeply committed to sharing the stories that bring us all closer together, and remind us of our common humanity. I recently saw a photograph of a woven native blanket, and read there again of how the weaver always creates an uneven place, a disruption in the pattern - a space they believe, where the spirit can enter. They intentionally disrupt the weave, the pattern to create a doorway, a space for the spirit, the soul to come through. Our stories, with their blurred edges and rough places, uneven or marred details give others an opening to see us, to truly see us. When someone dear to us dies, we remember moments and stories. The smallest of details, the colors and patterns suddenly take on significance for it brings the person back to us. The color of his hair, the way she held her cup or used her hands to speak. Remembering, reconnecting, recovering ourselves. This can be a daily, minute by minute process that can be easy to forget. Who is the weaver? Where does our blanket end? Who will it cover? By remembering and sharing our stories, beautiful and challenging, we are honoring ourselves. And by listening, deeply listening, we are honoring each other. Deep greens of summertime. Close heat pressing in. Cool expansive air allowing us to rest. So many spaces and openings. May we each find moments of rest and inspiration in this season of green. with care, Rev. Telos
