## *Message from our Minister*

*"Come, Come, Whoever You Are, wanderer, worshipper, lover of leaving,  
Ours is no caravan of despair. Come, yet again, come." [words adapted from Rumi]*

Come, come, whoever you are, a song that we have in our hymnal that I remember singing in many a circle of people, young and old. Often it is sung when people who don't often come together find themselves across from each other. It is an invitation, a reminder that we are all traveling through our individual lives but do remain always, part of a larger circle. We are gathering on Sunday, September 1<sup>st</sup> as a larger community of Strafford to re-commit ourselves to the important actions and work of facing climate change. It is a time of reckoning; a time to recognize the stark realities of what human beings have created. The creatures that are being driven to extinction, the lands that are burning, the waters that are rising. The Rev. Jim Antal has dedicated his life and work to combatting climate change. He offers education and facts but also wisdom and advice for congregations and communities. The time is now, and has been for awhile, to act, to do what we can. To speak, to write, to protest, to come together and find strength and solace in communities of faith. We are a part of this movement whether we feel that way or not. And we will most likely not receive credit or recognition for that action. That isn’t why we are doing it. We are part of the human family that must show up and open our eyes to the realities. The time is now. Let us honor and remember the earth and the circle we are a vital member of. Every voice and action makes a difference.
